MONTEVALLO Main Street Memories

SERGEANT ROBERT FARRINGTON BRIDGE

Depending on your perspective, it could be said that Main Street either begins or ends at the bridge that spans Shoal Creek just down the bluff from Montevallo City Hall. Photographic evidence exists that shows that a bridge of one sort or another has made life easier and drier here for human and animal travelers since the 1850's.

The bridge that handles a considerable amount of northand south-bound motorized traffic today was completed and put into service in the mid-1930's.

In 1996, Staff Sgt. Robert L. Farrington Jr., of Brierfield, five miles south of Montevallo, was among the dead when an Air Force plane crashed near Dubrovnik, Croatia.

In the aftermath of Farrington's death, a number of concerned local citizens (led by Dr. Mike Mahan) and supported by city and county officials, sought to honor his service and memory by naming the bridge over Shoal Creek at the foot of Main Street the Sgt. Robert L. Farrington, Jr., Memorial Bridge. Thanks to the efforts of these individuals and groups, state approval for the request was soon to come.

The Farrington Bridge, as it was now known, closed for about a year in 2004 for a significant upgrade and expansion and was reopened to regular traffic in April of 2005. At that time a celebration that included a parade was put on by the city and a new sign, declaring its namesake, was installed.



After several years of effort to locate a photograph of Sgt. Farrington in his Air Force uniform, a Montevallo Main Street Veterans Banner was printed and installed in time for Veterans Day 2022. Appropriately, Farrington's banner was positioned at the foot of Main Street just below City Hall near the bridge over Shoal Creek that bears his name.



At the time of his death, Sgt. Farrington was stationed at Ramstein Air Base, Germany and was assigned to the 76th Airlift Squadron of the 86th Airlift Wing, U.S. Air Force. The 76th operated more

The 76th operated more than a dozen executive transport aircraft for distinguished visitor travel and Sgt. Farrington was in charge of coordinating in-flight amenities for dignitaries flying all over the world. He was in his 13th year of service in the Air Force.

A total of 35 passengers and crew perished in the crash. Among them was Ron Brown, Secretary of Commerce in President Bill Clinton's cabinet.

In August of 1996, Sgt. Farrington's father, Robert L. Farrington, Sr., received a letter from Michael Kantor, who President Clinton appointed to succeed Ron Brown as Secretary of Commerce. Secretary Kantor had recently completed the mission to Croatia and Bosnia-Herzegovina begun by Secretary Brown. While there, Secretary Kantor and his traveling party climbed the mountain where the Air Force transport went down. They laid a wreath at the crash site and held a brief memorial service there in

their memory. In the letter to Mr. Farrington, Secretary Kantor quoted President

Clinton, saying "They were a glowing testimonial to the power of individuals to improve their own lives and elevate the lives of others and make a better future for others". Secretary Kantor concluded by saying, "We climbed that mountain not just with the President's words in mind but with your wishes and cares in our hearts. Please be assured that the work that Robert, Secretary Brown, and the others began will be remembered through the ongoing pursuit of peace and healing and progress."

The body of Staff Sergeant Robert L. Farrington, Jr., was recovered from the site by the Air Force and sent home for burial. He rests in the family plot in the Montevallo City Cemetery.

MONTEVALLO MAIN STREET MEMORIES is adapted from the series, THROWBACK THURSDAY, a **Montevallo Historical Society** and **Montevallo Main Street** partnership started in 2018. REMEMBERING BLANCHE M. COGER

She poured her heart out into her students. That's what I was looking for. She poured her heart into her students. And she didn't see the color. -- Ethel Mae Thompson

Talk to people who attended Prentice HS. originally Montevallo Negro HS, and one name always comes up. Blanche M. Coger, a teacher of history who insisted on the highest standards for her students. She retired in 1974 after teaching for 44 years, the final four years at the desegregated Montevallo HS. In 1965 she was honored as Teacher of the Year for Shelby County. To this day her name is spoken with respect. "When B. M. Coger name come up . . . it's a good name," says Ethel Mae Thompson.

The following remembrances come from a conversation between Ethel Mae Thompson and James Salter recorded by Kathy King in February 2023. Ethel Mae counts Mrs Coger as one of three teachers who changed her life. (The others were Mrs. Onnie Dell Fluker and Mrs. G. C. Massey.) James, who lived with and drove Mrs. Coger after her husband died, provides glimpses of her life away from the classroom. Here are some highlights of the conversation.

Ethel Mae remembers her as a "tough teacher, very. But she was loving. I mean she was just extremely demanding that we get an education. She didn't play. If you was in her room you just had to do your work." And if you didn't? "She would give us a paddling." (This was during the 60s and early 70s when parents still supported physical punishment -- paddlings, smacks with a ruler. Both Ethel Mae and James report that if you got paddled by Mrs. Coger, you could expect a beating at home. "If you got a whipping at school, by the time you got home you were gonna get another whipping," James confirmed.)

She was especially strict with the girls. She wouldn't put up with short skirts or makeup in her classroom. Ethel Mae remembers one incident where a girl dared to come wearing red lipstick -- "when I say it was red, it was red" -- and when she didn't completely wipe it off herself, Mrs. Coger finished the job with a rag she kept close by. "You don't come in Mrs. Coger's room with no lipstick on." She encouraged everyone. "She just wanted us to get that education. And she demanded that we do our work and that we could do it." "I don't have dumb students," she repeatedly insisted. "Without an education you can't get anywhere. But if



you bust these books open and you get it up here [Ethel Mae gestures to her head], nobody can take it away."

James was in her 8th grade class in Montevallo HS in 1970, the first year of full integration. "She treated the black and the white the same in that class. She still had the paddle at the high school. So no matter what color you were, if you didn't bring your homework in or did your lesson, she wasn't gonna get up now from her desk. She would call you to her desk and you would get it." He chuckles, and Ethel adds, "she wouldn't do no chasing." James agrees: "No, she didn't get up from that desk. She had a ruler too. She would use that ruler. You would hold out your hand."

James got to know Mrs Coger as well as anyone in town in some ways. From the 10th grade until the start of his senior year in college -- he was a Business major at UM -- he spent much of his time at her house. After her husband died, she asked his parents if he could come stay with her at night. She wanted company. "And you know, I didn't have a say in it, because it was Mrs Coger."

He describes going "up the hill, past the Mason Hall, past Leon Harris's house, past Shiloh, to where Mr. Goldsmith lives now, that's where Mrs Coger lived." Every evening he walked over there, every morning he would return home and get ready to go to school.

Little did James know how living with Mrs Coger would advance his education. He learned how to make a bed --with fitted sheets, no less. "Wow, this was a new experience for me." She put him to work in her garden, after a Mr. Johnson who lived in the community had dug it up. James would plant flowers and then the weeds came. "And she would sit there on the back porch while I'm back here pulling up the weeds." On Saturdays he would "clean house for her, vacuum and sweep the floor, dust, all of that. Mopped up the kitchen floor."

James would drive her to church in her green Dodge and all over Shelby county. "Turn here," she would say, "turn there." He never knew where they were going. The first time he drove her to Montgomery to visit her sister was a scary new experience: "I was so nervous gettin' on that interstate."

Mrs. Coger was hard and demanding. She struck fear in the hearts of some of her students but Ethel Mae and James agree that she inspired warm feelings as well. She earned her students' respect, white kids and black, and they all loved her. "That's the woman we're talking about. She poured her heart into her students. That's what I was looking for. She poured her heart into her students. And like James said she didn't see the color. You was just her student. And that meant a lot to her."

Hello, Citizens of Montevallo!

I hope everyone is well and ready for the April line up of activities in town. The 2023 Spring calendar is loaded with exciting events!

Montevallo Youth baseball, softball and soccer practice/ games and travel ball tournaments have already begun. Please support our youth and be on the lookout for visitors in town for these sporting events.

The City of Montevallo Parks and Recreation Board will host its annual Easter Egg Hunt at Orr Park on Sat., April 8th. The event will begin at 10am and the egg hunt will start at 11am. You will enjoy games, contests, children's activities, the Balloon Man, the Egg Hunt and more. I even heard that the Easter Bunny may be there! See for yourself and bring the pets too!!

Sat., April 8th will also bring the inaugural Vallo Backyard BBQ Cookoff to town from 1 to 5pm. This event is a project created and organized by the UM, Spring 2023, Social Entrepreneurship and Sustainability Class. This event is designed to be fun, competitive, and family friendly, all while helping support, raise awareness and funds for the Boys and Girls Club of Montevallo. The BBQ Tasting will begin at 2pm, with the Awards and the Recognition Ceremony at 4:30pm. Activities will include a rock wall, bungee jumping, a bouncy house, games, a competitive relay race, a raffle, and the BBQ competition! Visitors to the Cookoff will be able to participate in activities and taste BBQ from all of the competing teams, and then determine winners through a popular vote. Admission for the general public will be \$5.00 but some activities will be at an extra charge.

The Montevallo Arts Collaborative will host Montevallo Arts Fest in Orr Park on Sat., April 15th, 2023 from 10am to 5pm. This outdoor, family-friendly arts festival will have something for everyone to enjoy. Artists will fill Orr Park, located on the tree-lined banks of Shoal Creek, to display and sell their work, which ranges from fine arts to artisan works and fine crafts. In addition to works for sale, there will be artists on hand to demonstrate their craft throughout the day. Children will have the opportunity to make a piece of art at the children's art section. Festival food will be available from several food truck favorites. Live music will spice things up on the outdoor stage. Admission is free.

Other April events include: free County dump day – Sat., April 1st; the UM Big Event – Sat., April 8th; Montevallo Chamber Golf Tournament at Cahaba Falls Country Club - Thurs., April 20th; 2nd Annual Spring Fling Family Food Truck Festival - Sat., April 22nd; The Mission Continues" Operation Plant It Forward Project" at George Dailey Park – Sat., April 22nd; Montevallo Rotary Club Job Fair at Parnell Library – Thurs., April 27th, Friday Nights at the Cove begins on Fri, April 28th and MHS Farm Day - Sat., April 29th;. The Chamber onion sale has begun and will going on through April 20th, I am pleased to announce that the Grainger Community Counseling and Wellness Clinic at the Sims House (1045 Middle Street) is now open. The clinic offers free mental health services for individuals ages five and older. Hours are Monday through Thursday, 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. You must schedule an appointment to talk to a therapist beforehand at communitycounseling@montevallo.edu or by calling 205-665-6377. Childcare is also available during counseling sessions when scheduled in advance. It is great to have these services available to the citizens of our town and is free of charge. If one person can be saved from drug addiction or from harming themselves, it will be worth every penny that we have invested. The Clinic is a joint project with the Montevallo Development Cooperative District (MDCD).

Now, to the question of is the glass half full or half empty? I am aware of negative talk from a few citizens concerning the possibility of a hotel coming to our city. The city is in an economic position to where a hotel would thrive and we would begin reaping the benefits of a lodging tax. Montevallo is currently losing lodging tax dollars to neighboring cities. We are also losing sales tax revenue when visitors stay in other towns. With the addition of athletic events at the University of Montevallo, the new UM cycling program and course, travel ball tournaments, the National Cemetery, American Village and the numerous events in our town, Montevallo could support a hotel. Do you really think that a company would invest millions of dollars in a venture with the idea of failure? I do not think they would. Recently, at UM softball and baseball games, the visiting team brought a vast number of fans. In conversation with them, it was asked by several as to why Montevallo doesn't have a hotel. The visitors had to be told that, at this point, we do not have a hotel but that we hope to have one soon. The parents stated that they had to stay in Hoover because the few hotels close to town were fully booked. I am sure Hoover Mayor Frank Brocato loves collecting lodging and sales tax benefits that would come to Montevallo if we had a hotel. The hotel developer (Cobblestone Inns and Suites) specializes in bringing lodging to small college towns and has expressed willingness to work with the Montevallo Historic Preservation Commission to make sure the building blends in with our current downtown cityscape.

I would also like to address the situation we currently have in town related to claims against the previous city administration. A group of citizens are passing out (and illegally placing in U. S. Postal Service mail boxes) pages of accusations that are unsubstantiated rumors that have floated around this town for years. This administration has been very transparent with citizens and continues to broadcast meetings online so everyone can stay informed on city issues. I am not concerned with what the previous administration may or may not have done during their time in office. I choose to concentrate on what THIS administration can accomplish and to continue moving forward in the right direction.

Please remember to shop Montevallo first! Local business owners have made an investment in our community and our city sales tax dollars depend on you. As always, thank you for the opportunity to serve as your mayor.

MONTEVALLO HIGH SCHOOL'S 1ST EVER WRESTLING STATE CHAMP

One year after sitting in the locker room heartbroken over a tiebreaker loss in the state championship, Montevallo High School wrestler Gavin Monk was back on Saturday, Feb. 18.

This time around, faced with a choice of redemption or heartbreak for a second year in a row, he delivered inside Huntsville's Von Braun Center. After spending the last year determined at redemption, putting in work on a daily basis, he jumped up emphatically after earning a 3-1 decision win over St. John Paul II's Jack Von Eschenbach.


It capped off a dominant run to the championship that saw Monk pick up three consecutive pins to earn his chance at redemption before closing out the 145-pound championship with the 3-1 decision to become the school's first state champion.

"Determination, grit, toughness, selflessness, poise, focus, leader, dependable and champion. That is Gavin Monk," head coach Garrett Langer said in congratulating his championship effort. "What an ending for this kid. One year ago, we sat in a locker room after a heartbreaking defeat in the state finals. All that moment did was motivate him even more."

It led him to not only bettering himself this season, but helping lead the team to a second straight area championship as well, leading the team with his drive.

"He's a true Bulldog at heart," Langer said. "He spent days, weeks and months of training in the MHS lunchroom and at








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REPLICA OF INDEPENDENCE HALL BEGINS

On Washington's Birthday 2020, ground was broken for Phase I of a replica Independence Hall at the American Village in Montevallo. Alabama Governor Kay Ivey cut the ribbon at the new West Wing of Independence Hall on November 4, 2021. The West Wing is the first phase of a larger project to raise a replica of Independence Hall before the 250th birthday (or semiquincentennial) of the United States of America on July 4, 2026.



On February 28, 2023, the American Village broke ground for Phase II of the Independence Hall Project. The new building and its programs will dramatically increase the educational reach and impact of the American Village, in Alabama and throughout the Nation. When complete, Independence Hall will increase the capacity of the American Village to teach and inspire over 250,000 students, teachers and other visitors each year, focused on the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the Bill of Rights: America's Charters of Freedom.




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The West Wing of Independence Hall is comprised of an interactive, multi-media foyer and multi-sensory theatre. In the foyer, visitors are transported back to Boston on the eve of Paul Revere's Ride. A 104-seat theatre with 18' x 31' screen in the back half of the building shows the original film - Choosing to Be an American People - the story of British colonists in America, suffering under cruel military actions and crippling taxes forced on them by King George III and the British Parliament, collectively choosing to fight for the right to govern themselves, to create a new Nation, a United States of America.

The central tower, to be constructed in Phase II of the project, will include two floors of educational spaces. On the ground floor will be two a Talking Portrait Gallery and the Assembly Room. Visitors will be engaged in lively debate taking place among a cast of founders in the Talking Portrait Gallery. In the Assembly Room, they will be immersed in conversations that took place during the "Miracle of Philadelphia" when delegates debated the Declaration of Independence. The second floor will house the "Great Hall" classroom, as well as a gallery of important documents, a multi-media broadcast studio, and a media library with student work stations. This facility will support on-site and outreach education for hundreds of thousands of students and teachers.

CEO Alan B. Miller said, "We are incredibly excited to get underway with construction of Phase II of our Independence Hall immersive education experience and look forward to engaging citizens of all ages with an exciting journey through the turbulent and miraculous founding of the United States. We are eternally thankful for the efforts of all our friends and contributors who have helped make this a reality. "

UNIVERSITY OF MONTEVALLO OPENS GRAINGER COUNSELING AND WELLNESS CLINIC TO OFFER FREE MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

The new and free-to-the-public Grainger Community Counseling and Wellness Clinic is now open following a grand opening with ribbon cutting on Feb. 17 at Sims House on the University of Montevallo campus. At no cost to its clients, the clinic provides: -General therapy -Group therapy -Play therapy for children -Telemental health virtual counseling

The clinic is open to anyone who makes an appointment during its hours of Monday through Thursday, 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Community members can find additional information and schedule an appointment online at montevallo.edu/ community-counseling-clinic. Appointments can also be scheduled by phone at 205-665-6377. The clinic's address is 1045 Middle St., Montevallo, AL 35115. The clinic was made possible through a partnership between the clinic's namesakes Michael and Donna Grainger, who donated to fund the clinic, the University of Montevallo, the City of Montevallo and Shelby County, which is known as the Montevallo Development Cooperative District (MDCD). The clinic will provide free mental health care to Montevallo residents and other local communities.

Since the clinic is also a training facility for graduate students specializing in clinical mental health, school counseling and couples and family counseling, the 30- to 45-minute counseling sessions will be conducted by eight to ten students in UM's graduate counseling program who are in the final clinical phase of their education.

Parker said she expects many of their clients will seek one-on-one treatment for anxiety and depression, which is on the rise in Alabama and nationwide, and the clinic has some rather unique treatment options. 'We have four therapy rooms – one is dedicated to play therapy, and one is dedicated to group therapy," she said. "The other two are for general therapy sessions. There are not too many places offering play therapy."

"Play therapy is a modality of counseling primarily used for children to help them process their feelings and emotions in a safe way using something that comes naturally for them. You use toys and other tangible things for them to help talk about how they're feeling. We use play because play is the language of kids."

Another unique feature of the clinic is its dedicated space for group counseling. There will be an ongoing group for grief and loss where people who've lost their spouse, children and/or parents can get the comfort and help they need. Telemental health counseling will be offered through a virtual video platform.

"Telemental health counseling is for people who can't make it into the center or don't live in the Montevallo area, have a lack of transportation or have a disability," Parker said. "This is for people who can't get counseling in a more traditional setting."




Childcare during counseling sessions is also available for those who need it if scheduled ahead of time.

"My hopes for the clinic are that it's a place of healing for people who are dealing with mental health challenges," Parker said. "That people come, feel supported and receive quality services that will improve the quality of their lives. Also, that our graduate students obtain excellent clinical experience that will prepare them for their careers in counseling."

Parker said the professional development opportunities afforded to graduate students at the University with the opening of the clinic continue to add to the prestige of a degree from UM.





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ONE HOUR TUNE-UP

The life of your bike will be extended with regular maintenance. Try our one-hour tune up this month!

Clean your bike – it may not seem like an important part of the tune-up but checking out your components is much easier with a clean bike. Plus, you will stay cleaner, work faster, and enjoy this tune-up with a clean bike.

Chain – your chain touches every aspect of your drive train. A worn chain can cause damage to other components of your bike. Inspect for rust, cracks, and stiff links. A chain wears over time - if you can pull your chain straight off the chain-rings and fully expose a tooth, you should replace the chain.

Bottom Bracket – this is the part of your bike that your pedals go through. These bearings take the brunt of the pedaling abuse. Spin your bottom bracket backwards (as if pedaling backwards). If you see anything other than buttery smooth movement, consider replacing the bearings.

Gears – bikes that have indexed gears (one click on the gear selector moves to another gear ring) need to be adjusted periodically. If you are unable to select every combination of gearing on your bike (front and back gears) consider reindexing/adjusting your derailleurs.

Cables – over time break and gear cables will stretch, wear out, and become dirty. Replacing your cables is an easy job that only takes a few minutes to have your bike feeling like new again.

Headset Bearings – this is the part where the front tire forks meet your bike frame (how you turn the bike). Mud and grime tend to build up in this bearing. Cleaning it by removing the front fork and handlebars and re-greasing this bearing will prolong the life of your bike.

Seat post – your seat post can fuse to the frame over time without annual maintenance. Mark the height on the post before loosening and removing the post (and saddle/bike seat) from the frame. Wipe old grime and grease from the frame and post. Re-grease the post before re-installing and adjusting the seat to the mark you made.

Accessories – look over your bike and see what else may be installed that you are no longer using or is broken/ worn. It is easy to overlook a broken water bottle cage or a missing grip or torn handlebar tape on a regular basis. Take time now to replace or remove these extras.

Performing this tune-up twice a year will extend the life of your bicycle by many years.
