TWO OF JACOB PERRY'S DAUGHTERS

Meet the family of Theodore Morris Allen and wife Mattie Perry Allen. She was a daughter of Jacob Perry, the Old Planter, whose house, Perry Hall (the Mahler House), is still standing at Shoal Creek Park just north of Montevallo. In the rocking chair is Mattie's sister who never married, Amelia Perry, born in 1840. By the curtain holding the fan is Bertie Helen Allen, who was in the first graduating class of what is now the University of Montevallo, Class of 1899, with only 3 members. She never married and was a school teacher. The girl wearing the dark dress and holding flowers is Bessie Allen. The little girl in white is Maggie (Margaret) Steele Allen. She died at age 21. The young man behind Amelia Perry is Edgar Perry Allen. The young man between Bessie and Bertie is George Allen. The photo dates sometime in the late 1890's. Mr. Allen's sister, Augusta, was married to lawyer Henry Wilson . The Wilsons lived in the recently restored first house on Shelby Street. His sister Ella Wilson Peters was the mother of Miss Mary and Miss Ella Peters, whom many of our older citizens will remember.

SAFETY SPOT

SMOKE ALARMS ARE A KEY PART of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

SAFETY TIPS

-Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.

-It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound. -Test all smoke alarms at least once a month.

-People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms that have strobe lights or bed shakers.

-Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

! Roughly 3 out of 5 deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or working smoke alarms !







Q&A ABOUT THE AMERICAN VILLAGE FESTIVAL OF TULIPS

Q: What is the Festival of Tulips?

A: It is a unique event that the American Village has each Spring where visitors can stroll through a field of over 80,000 tulips and pick the ones they want to take home.

Q: What does it cost?

A: Admission is \$5 per person, and tulips – bulb included – are \$2.00 each plus tax

Q: When does the Festival run?

A: The Festival of Tulips open each Spring when 20% of the flowers are in bloom (usually mid to late February). It lasts as long as the flowers are blooming (usually about 4 weeks). During the Festival the American Village is open Monday-Saturday 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and Sunday 12:00 – 4:00 p.m., weather permitting.

Q: Are dogs allowed?

A: No, with the exception of service animals with appropriate identification.

Q: Are photos allowed?

A: Absolutely! Casual photography is encouraged, so it's also a great opportunity for family pics. Professional photographers should contact the American Village to make an appointment for sittings. There is a \$50/day fee for professional photographers.

$\mathbf{Q}:\;$ Where do the tulips come from, and when do you plant them?

A: The American Village purchases tulips from Holland, and they are planted in December each year.

Q: Do I need to bring my own basket and trowel?

A: No. Both will be provided at the tulip field.

Q: How do I care for my tulips once I pick them?

A: Keep them moist until you get them home. Then you can separate the flowers from the bulbs and enjoy the flowers in a vase (they will last about a week with proper conditions), or plant bulb and flower straight into the soil. If you want the longest bloom time at home, pick flowers that are still not fully open.

Q: Will the tulips I plant in my yard come back and bloom next year?

A: The quick answer is no. It does not get cold enough in Alabama for tulips to be perennial. However, there are steps you can take to help your bulbs bloom again. A "Care Sheet" is given to every customer who purchases tulips at the American Village, and this sheet explains the process.

HOW TO PICK TULIPS

- 1. Grab a picking basket
- 2. When you find a tulip you want, reach down as close to the soil level as possible, grasp the stem and pull up flower and bulb.
- 3. Pick as many tulips as you want, but ONLY PICK what you intend to purchase. Tulips are \$2.00 each including the bulb.





- 4. When you're finished picking, bring your basket of tulips to the packing tent.
- 5. Count your tulips as you lay them out on the kraft paper provided. Wrap them, tape them, and write the number of tulips you picked on the outside of the package.

Baseball: The Best Game Ever

Seems like we've been playing baseball for a mighty long time. At least as long as we've been free. Baseball's the best game there ever was. -- Kadir Nelson

The best game ever: that's what baseball was for Montevallo's two inductees into the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum in Kansas City. Raymond "Lefty" Haggins and Clifford "Duby" DuBose, former Birmingham Black Barons, are not exactly an untold story. In 2014 the city named two ballfields at Stephens Park in their honor. But their almost forgotten achievements need to be retold. What they did on and off the field in the last century was a source of great pride to Black folks throughout the region. Their legacy could inspire a new generation. This sketch draws from published interviews as well as memories of two descendants, Faye Haggins and Cliff DuBose, Jr.

A theme in the story of both men is belief in themselves. Haggins's daughter, Faye, tells us that when her father told

people he would play professionally they would say something like, yeah, right, but he always believed he would make it and he did. When he graduated from high school, he walked across the stage to receive his diploma and when he reached the other side, he took off his cap and gown and gave them back, picked up his luggage and left for Spring Training.

Both came from close-knit mining families. From his father Haggins gained a lifelong love of reading, and from his mother an appreciation of the value of education, honesty and respect for all persons. A Montevallo native, DuBose grew up one of ten children. He spoke often of his mother's "kind-heart and caring ways." Some will still remember her as a lunchroom cook at Almont Elementary until the closing of the school in 1970. She also took in wash and ironing -and was her son's biggest fan.

"Lefty" Haggins grew up in Bibb County but moved to Jefferson County to take advantage of the greater baseball

opportunities. His passion for the game emerged early. His daughter Faye remembers his mother saying she couldn't keep a mop or broom in the house because young Ray would cut off the wooden handles and get out in her flower bed and swing at the bees. To play ball he and other kids in the neighborhood used whatever materials were at hand -- tin cans, rocks, other homemade balls. In high school, he played sandlot ball on Saturdays. One time, after a game-changing hit, "the fans tossed money onto the field for him" as he rounded the bases. "What a thrill! He had enough cash to take his girlfriend to the movies that night." (Baseball in *Living Color*, #121)

Haggins would go on to barnstorm with the House of David (Minneapolis), playing all over the Midwest and Ontario. After a stint in the army, he went into spring training with the Black Barons but, due to a set lineup, went north to play with the Memphis Red Sox.

Asked in 1995 if he had enjoyed his career he answered, "I loved it. Loved it." (His wife Eunice: "He loves baseball. That's all he talked about, really.") The game gave him a chance to travel and to play in most of the major league parks. At one point he roomed with country singer-tobe Charlie Pride. The story is told that the owner of the Birmingham Barons traded him for ... a bus! Why? Because on the team bus he was always picking on his guitar and keeping the guys awake.

His finest memory? "Hitting a home run in Yankee Stadium," he chuckles. (You can listen to this interview online in the *Birmingham Black Barons Oral History Collection*, BPLONLINE).

"Duby" DuBose shared Haggins' passion for the game. He too had to be inventive. Games took place in the street in front of Almont Elementary, where he went to grade school. The first step was always "hunting down an old tennis ball and a worn-out walking stick." He went on to play ball at Prentice High School. He debuted professionally in 1958 at 3rd base with the Black Barons. Later that year he was traded to the Memphis Red Sox. He was given a tryout with the Brooklyn Dodgers but due to an injury returned home. He continued to play in the Industrial Leagues of Birmingham after his professional retirement. As for a game highlight, "I hit two game winning home runs for the Stockham Championship, a local semi-pro team." (Source: *NLBM eMuseum.*)

What did baseball mean to DuBose? Cliff Jr. says "it meant the world to him. He loved the game." His heroes were Hank Aaron and Jackie Robinson because they broke the color barrier. Seeing men of color in the majors inspired him. After retirement from professional baseball, he devoted much of his time to helping young baseball players follow their passion. He coached sandlot baseball in Montevallo for 15 years, and was proud, that last year, to throw out the first pitch of the season. If he could talk to kids today, he would tell them, "Work hard. Love your craft. Be true to the game."

Having a thirty-eight-year background in the forestry industry, I like to refer to March as when "the sap is starting to rise". March is when trees start to put on leaves and bud out by pulling sap up from the root systems. When "the sap starts to rise" in Montevallo, it means that we are growing and achieving new things. The downtown area had two new businesses open over the last two weeks. Montevallo is proud to welcome Sun Rise Doughnuts and Strand Coffee House to our city! Both businesses had ribbon cutting events and outstanding opening days. The city is also looking forward to a few more business opening in the coming weeks. The highly anticipated Highway 25 sidewalk project that will kick off this late spring/early summer. The sidewalk project is much-needed and will make most of Highway 25 walkable. The sidewalks will start at Lucky's and continue to Pic 'n Sav.

The city recently opened its first Storm Shelter. Storm Shelter #1 is located at Stephens Park. Montevallo would like to invite the public out to an Open House for Storm Shelter #1 on Sun., Feb. 27 2-4pm. In the near future, Storm Shelter #2, will be built behind Fire Station #1. The city is excited to have received a grant from Shelby County for \$38,150 this past week that will be used to add restrooms at Stephens Park. The city had no idea that, when we built the park twenty-five years ago, we would have 1,000+ people in the park on weekends. The new restrooms are desperately needed to meet the needs of the visitors that frequent the park for ball tournaments.

The city is working hard to bring new projects and businesses to town but I am disappointed to say that we missed out on an ALDOT grant for improvements at the Crossroads area of Highway 119. We intend to reapply for the grant next year and have high hopes that we will receive it. The city is still seeking investors that would be interested in opening a hardware store in town. Our community is in need of a hardware store nearby and I feel it would get plenty of support.

Walt Czeskleba Day was celebrated on February 22, 2022. Walt has been in business and serving the citizens of Montevallo for 50 years! I hope everyone was able to stop by Czeskleba TV and congratulate Walt on his extraordinary accomplishment. Congratulations, Walt!!!

The Montevallo Arbor and Beautification Board will hold Arbor Day festivities on Saturday, February 26th, 2022 from 9:00 – 1:00 at the recycling center. One thousand bareroot seedlings were purchased and will be distributed to citizens this year. Montevallo was also recognized as a "Tree City" again this year. I am proud of the hard work that our Arbor and Beautification Board puts forth each year to bring this event to the citizens of our town and meet Tree City standards.

The American Village will celebrate the Festival of Tulips in March. The festival will begin when at least 20% of the flowers are in bloom. Last year, the blooms were ready in late February so the 2022 opening should be right around the corner. Updates will be posted on the American Village website and Facebook page when they are closer to opening.



PARNELL MEMORIAL LIBRARY SELECTED FOR COMPETITIVE FEDERAL HUMANITIES GRANT \$10,000 Grant Will Help the Library Recover from the Coronavirus Pandemic

The Parnell Memorial Library has been selected as one of 200 libraries nationwide for the American Library Association's American Rescue Plan: Humanities Grants for Libraries opportunity, an emergency relief program to assist libraries that have been adversely affected by the pandemic.

With funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, the Parnell Memorial Library will use funds to anchor itself in the community as a strong humanities institution. The competitive award comes with a \$10,000 grant that will help the library deliver excellent programs and services related to culture, history, literature, and other humanities subjects.

More than 370 libraries applied for the grant, according to ALA. View the full list of selected libraries.

The participating libraries, selected through a competitive, peer-reviewed application process, include public libraries, academic/college libraries, K-12 libraries, and tribal, special and prison libraries. The recipients represent 45 states and Puerto Rico and serve communities ranging in size from 642 residents in Weir, Kansas, to the city of Los Angeles. Libraries were chosen with an emphasis on reaching historically underserved and/or rural communities.

"We are so proud to be chosen for this amazing opportunity," said Library Director Savannah Kitchens. "This grant will allow our library to better serve our patrons and plan strong, enriching humanities programming as we come out of the pandemic."

The Parnell Memorial Library will use the grant funds to create a series of informational sessions to connect high school students and their parents and caregivers to scholarship and certification program opportunities. More information and dates for these events will be released in the future.

"Libraries have faced significant hardships throughout the pandemic —from budget cuts to staff furloughs to building closures — especially in our communities of the greatest need," said ALA President Patty Wong. "This crucial support from NEH will enable our beloved institutions, and the dedicated people who run them, to rebuild and emerge from the pandemic stronger than ever."







WHAT'S THE BEST USE OF MY REMODELING DOLLARS?

When it comes to remodeling, some changes that you make to your home are going to net you a big return on your investment. Sometimes this return comes in the form of an increase to the overall value of your property, while sometimes the return is more in the form of your enjoyment and the overall usefulness that your home has for you. 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IMPROVING COMMUNITY BIKEABILITY: EASE OF BIKING

Community bikeability (how suitable/fit for biking an area can be) is scored in a number of ways. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) asks six questions that help us assess neighborhood bikeability. This month we will focus on the fourth question– Was it easy for you to use your bike?

Take a moment to reflect on your last bike ride. Issues you may have encountered include: no maps, signs, or road markings to find your way, no safe or secure place to leave a bicycle at your destination, hard to find a direct route, scary dogs, or the route was too hilly.

Immediate solutions to these challenges:

• plan your route ahead of time

 \bullet find somewhere close by to lock your bike (never leave it unlocked)

- report scary dogs to the animal control department
- learn to use all of your gears



Long-term solutions to these challenges:

- ask your community to publish a local bike map
- ask your public works department to install bike parking racks at key destinations & help them identify optimum locations
- plan your local route network to minimize the impact of steep hills
- establish or join a bicycle user group at your workplace

After reviewing both short and long-term solutions, commit to seeing at least one solution through to the end. Getting involved is as easy as contacting the local government and your representative. Visit cityofmontevallo.com for a list of department heads, committee members, and your local municipal representative.

Bicycling, whether for transportation or recreation, is a great way to get physical activity into your day. Riding should be something you enjoy doing. Choose routes that match your skill level – start slowly and build your potential.




