McCULLEY'S FOOD STORE

Prior to 1960 when the first true supermarket came to Montevallo, there were five small grocery or mercantile stores on Main Street offering a varying selection of food products to local families. Several of these

stores had butcher shops and offered fresh vegetables when in season. In those days, a grocery would not survive if they didn't deliver phoned-in grocery orders to the doorsteps of their customers. The deliveries were usually made by a teenage boy on a heavy-duty bicycle with an oversized basket to hold the grocery bags.

McCulley's Food Store moved into the space next door to Alabama Power Co. on Main Street in 1938. The newspaper announcement you see here ran in the Montevallo Times on March 24 of that year. The previous occupant had been a business called the "Dollar Store." Proprietor Teamon McCulley, moved his existing business from Shelby Street, near the railroad depot, and remained in this location until the store closed approximately 40 years later. McCulley's offered personalized service and the largest selection in town. And you could count on Mr. Tommy Latham, in his white apron over a dress

McCulley's Store To Be Moved This Week

Teamon McCulley will move his grocery business this week to occupy the building next to Alabama Power Company, the former location of the Dollar Store, He will vacate the place he has occupied for the past four years near the Southern depot.

In his new store Mr. McCulley will have more space and will carry a greatly increased stock of groceries and food items. His plans are to make his store one of the most attractive in this section of the state. And of course, his service will be kept up to the highest point of efficiency.

The move will be made this weekend, after which it will require a few days to get everything in proper place. But there will be no interruption in the business.

Within a few weeks Mr. McCulley will invite the public to attend a formal opening of this new store.

shirt and tie, to be at the cash register taking care of every customer and making them feel right at home.

The Alabama Power Co. moved out of their corner location around 1960 into offices in the new Whaley Shopping Center next door to the recently completed Food Center supermarket. Soon after, Mr. McCulley expanded his store into the Alabama Power Co. space with the intention of meeting the competition anticipated from the Food Center. Almost overnight, the sleepy grocery scene in Montevallo bloomed into a food shopping paradise. Needless to say, the smaller, oldline businesses on Main Street were not long for this world.

CELEBRATING MONTEVALLO CHAMBER TURNING 75

During the year of 1949 when the Montevallo Chamber of Commerce was established, the Montevallo Bowling Center, four modern lanes with equipment, opened on Friday, March 4, 1949,

advertised price of .20 cents per lane. The article read "For the Chick Fullman's swanky new bowling Emporium opening feature the Mayor and Councilmen of Montevallo are challenged by a scrub team headed by Bob DeSear and John Caldwell." The Modern Beauty Shop was offering preeaster specials. Nordan Hardware was stating that Glidden was back again, Montevallo Lumber Co. was offering Lowe Brothers one coat PLAX to make old things new again and Wooten Motor ad slogan was FEEL the TIP-TOE Miracle of a '49 Ford! (with the image of a high heel shoe hitting the gas pedal). In 1949, a section of the Montevallo Times was titled The Month In Rural Alabama with features about diarying, cattle, hogs, seeds, fruits, vegetables, turkeys, gardening, legume, farmers, farming equipment, sheep, extension services, woodlands, grazing, poultry, fishing, flies, wasp, ponds, irrigation, and agricultural experiment station.





The Ghosts of King House II: Aunt Julia and that "little lean, slim place of er grave-yard"

Ed. note: This is the second of three Untold Stories about stories that circulated within the local African American community early in the 1900s, many originating during slavery times. In 1913, a pair of college students went out seeking tales about "hants, ghostes, en sperrits." They printed three of their interviews in a college publication. These interviews are invaluable. They are presented as if transcribed verbatim and thus offer a rare opportunity to hear the distinctive voices and views of three elderly members of the first-freed generation.

Last month we met Uncle Ben, a natural-born "signifyin" storyteller known locally for regaling White folks with yarns about Montevallo's ghosts. This month we meet Aunt Julia, a woman who has lived in these parts a "powerful long time." If she is the same Julia owned by Edmund King, she would be in her mid-eighties at the time of the interview.

Aunt Julia is at first a reluctant to give the students what they want, a "real ghostly story." She throws up her hands in dismay. She's too busy to fool around with ghost stories. But after "some persuasion," she admits she has heard "lots of cur'us things 'bout dat ole house whar dey puts you when youse sick." (King House at this time served as the college's infirmary.) But she disavows all belief in ghosts: "dis ain't sayin' I b'lieve in hants." She is only "tellin' you whut dey done tole me."

The scene of many of these curious happenings is the King family cemetery, that "little lean, slim place of er grave-yard behin' de old house." (A good description, by the way, of the cemetery still maintained on the UM campus, tucked in between Hill House and Harman Hall.) People who believe in "hants," as she does not, claim to see lights moving between the graveyard and the house. As the tales would have it, they belonged to the ghost of "old Marse King" looking for money he hid before he went off to war. (He never went off to war.)

Once Aunt Julia gets into the storytelling spirit, she begins to sauce the tale with "ghostly" details. "You see, ever' time anybody goes down dar [to the cemetery] dey feels hot air gushin' in dere faces, and de do' it jus' bangs shut fo' dey can git in no piece. They hears chains rattlin,' and er groanin' jes lak somebody er dyin'." That's right, rattling chains and dying groans.

As if to say the nonsense can go no further, she brings her story to an abrupt stop: "Dat's ther only tale I knows 'bout the infirm'ry."

Aunt Julia may be making fun of widespread notions about the superstitious nature of Black folks. She uses over-the-top Halloweenish detail to give her listeners a "real ghostly story" while "signifyin" -- to those who can hear -- that folks looking for spooky ghost stories have little understanding of the African American experience of the spiritual world.

In 1982, Aunt Julia's story was retold by beloved Alabama folklorist storyteller Kathryn Tucker Windham. In a hilarious reversal, she assigns Julia's no-nonsense skepticism to her mistress and makes Julia a superstitious servant who sees mysterious lights in the cemetery because she misses her master so terribly. Julia is made to insist that "Marse Edmund's ghost is out there taking care of the money he hid." The jaw-dropping response of her mistress must be read in full:

"Now, Aunt Julia---,' Elizabeth Shortridge began. Then she stopped. Why try to reason with the superstitious woman? So, instead of continuing the conversation, she dismissed Julia by saying, 'Please go out to the kitchen and see if there's any clabber. I think I'd like some for supper" (Windom, 118).

Try to reason with the superstitious woman, indeed. Best order her back to the kitchen.

So let's give Aunt Julia the last word. In 1913, in her own voice, she may take us closer to the experience of spirituality of people of African descent during the era of bondage than any foolery about rattling chains, deathly groans, or much-missed masters. The student interviewers say: "They tell us, Auntie, we are often nearer the spirit world than we think." She responds: "Now, ain't yer talkin'.

Next month the Ghost Stories series concludes with the interview with "Uncle Frank" and the "signifyin" story of Edmund King's supposed fatal fall from one of his own peach trees.

Mayor's Message...

Hello, citizens of Montevallo.

I hope everyone is well. Can you believe that spring is just around the corner and the clocks are about to spring forward? It is time to get started on your flowerbeds, gardens and yards. Spring is one of my favorite seasons.....minus



the pollen. This season of the year is all about renewal and new growth. As I have stated before, the timber industry refers to it as "when the sap starts to rise". When the trees start to bud, they pull extra moisture out of the soil which helps the forest floor start to dry. This is needed because of all the rainfall we have in the winter. Another great aspect of Spring is that the fish start biting. I know that anglers are ready to hit their favorite fishing spot and reel in that first catch of the year. I can remember back in the day my dad took me fishing. Those are fond memories that I will never forget. So, take a kid fishing.

The Highway 25 sidewalk project is close to completion. This project has been in the works since November 2020. Sidewalks will create a safer route for pedestrians to walk from Pic 'n Save to Lucky's. The sidewalks are projected to be finished in March of this year. In addition, a potential development may be coming to the vacant lot next to the Dialvsis Center on Highway 25. The landowner and the developer are still in negotiations on this project but I hope to be able to bring good news in the near future. Everyone in town will enjoy the potential new development and it will bring much needed revenue to the city.

The city is also excited about major changes coming to Moore's Crossroads. Last year, Montevallo received almost \$2 million in grant money (ATRIP 2) for this project. The plan will allow for new turn lanes, traffic signals and aesthetic improvement at the intersection. The crossroads area is the gateway into Montevallo from the north and that intersection gives a first impression of the city. The surveys for the project are about 80% complete for the right-of-way (ROW). The city is also in negotiations with a developer regarding a substantial sized commercial development on the 22-acre tract that was annexed into the city last year. The city is currently losing sales tax revenue to surrounding cities. Once this development is completed, it could bring close to 2 million dollars in yearly sales tax revenue to the city and potentially provide around 250 jobs to our city. The development will be a great asset and a game changer for the city.

Repairs to the Mahler House are about to resume. I am looking forward to finally getting the house restored to fulfill the Mahler's wishes. I have fond memories from my youth of the home. I can remember, as a high school freshman, helping Mr. John Mahler haul hay at the farm. When the workers broke for lunch, most of the time farm hands were given sandwiches to eat on the back porch but the Mahler sisters would prepare what most people would enjoy for Sunday lunch. The meal was even served on fine china. I also remember that it was the first time I had fresh mint leaves in

my tea.

The Montevallo Parks and Recreation Department is making preparations for Stephens Park to be in full swing with the 2024 baseball/softball season. Please plan to come out and enjoy some travel ball tournaments this spring and summer. You will be amazed at the volume of people in attendance and the amount of revenue that these tournaments bring to our town. Also, don't forget to catch a UM baseball or softball game when you can.

With pleasant weather on the horizon, community events will be popping up regularly in our city. The American Village 2024 Festival of Tulips will begin Sat. Feb. 24th and continue 7 days a week until the flowers stop blooming. Admission is \$5 and tulip bulbs are \$2 each. Mark your calendars for Montevallo ArtsFest. The arts festival will be held from 10 am - 5 pm on April 20th at Orr Park and will feature over 100 gifted artists and artisans. These are just two of the upcoming events scheduled for this Spring. Please stay up to date on all upcoming events by visiting the city's website or Facebook page.

Remembering WAYNE BEATY

To say that Wayne Beaty was a friend to 9 legions would likely be an understatement. Within hours of his passing on Saturday, December 9, 2023 almost 400 people had offered individual condolences. His loss is mourned and his life celebrated by his wife Rebecca, son Jake, daughter Heather, and those hundreds who commented.



A native of Birmingham, Wayne grew up in Hueytown where he was in the band, developing and cultivating his lifelong love of music.

After high school he attended the University of Alabama for a year and then, like so many young men of that era, found himself in the Army. He was a proud member of the 101st Airborne, serving a year in Vietnam stationed at Camp Eagle. Returning to the States, he was stationed at Fort Benning, where he and Rebecca lived for about a year.

Growing up in Hueytown, he loved NASCAR and automobiles. Later working at Western Auto and at Brownell Pontiac, he honed his natural God-given skills as a mechanic and fixer of all kinds of things. It was never an imposition for anyone to ask Wayne's advice or help on a car problem. He loved any opportunity to work on a car. Need a part? Wayne would scour the junkyards until he found it and installed it.

The Beatys moved to Montevallo in 1978 when he took a position as superintendent of the coal Washer at Boothton. Then, he began going to government surplus auctions with his father-in-law and found the employment niche that really suited. He started Beaty Diversified Sales in 1981 and toured the country in his 1972 blue truck.

An indefatigable sense of humor. Nobody left a conversation with Wayne without having laughed a time or two. And if his language was frequently "colorful," it was never vulgar. Friend Doug Rodgers said: "Your multitudinous voluntary efforts in our town have made it a better place to live, and you and Rebecca reared two fine children in the community, an accomplishment not to be taken lightly." Two of those community efforts were theater and Boy Scouts.

Wayne fell in love with community theater purely by chance. While attending an audition event at Mike Mahan's he participated in a reading and found himself with a part in a play. He was hooked and for decades he was a mainstay of the Montevallo Main Street players. He served as a board member, producer, prop manager, set builder and all-around supporter whenever needed. He also occasionally took the stage. His performance as Elwood P. Down in Harvey is memorable in MMSP lore. Jimmie Stewart played the role no better in the movie.

He was equally involved in Boy Scout Troop 559. Dorothy Grimes, mother of two Eagle scouts, said: "Wayne gave those boys more than just rope skills and camping experience. He

made scouts a place to have fun and be happy while you were learning. He cared about them all and they all knew it."

One of those Eagles, David Grimes, agreed: He was not one to teach conventional rope tying and fire building skills. I don't ever recall him teaching me a single by-the-book merit badge class, but you were blessed as a Scout if you experienced the 'Wayne Beaty merit badge.' Unlike the merit badge sash that gets put away in the closet and lost over time, you have to carry and use the 'Wayne Beaty merit badge' for your whole life experience.

"The WB merit badge taught you invaluable life skills. Things like getting your hands dirty rebuilding the engine of a '66 Mercury (like he did with Larry Readel). How to smile and laugh when life isn't going as planned; when the rain is pouring down and the mosquitoes are relentlessly attacking in the backwoods of Bibb County. How to drive a 3-on-the-tree truck (I think Wayne's truck was more like a 2-on-a-tree) with loose steering, and if you can drive THAT, you can drive ANYTHING. How to give to those less fortunate like the time he passed around a one-a pound bag of peanut M&Ms on a camp out knowing that's the best treat some kids would have that weekend."

He was a founding member of Round Table, a loose "philosopher's club" at JeRoe's Deli on Main Street. It was a gathering that daily drew a disparate group of Montevallo folks with verbal solutions to all of the world's problems and more.

Steve Gilbert summed up Wayne's death this way: "The heart has four chambers. One chamber is filled with sadness at the passing of my friend. Another chamber is filled with joy, that my friend has crossed over from this life and his spirit is free and that his body and soul no longer suffer from the pain and ravages of cancer. "Another chamber is filled with anger, that the Vietnam War is still taking lives some 50 years after the laying down of arms. Anger that our government still does not provide those that serve the assistance and care they need and deserve. "The fourth chamber is filled with memories of time spent talking about racing. We were two old gearheads from Huevtown. Memories of lunchtime conversations around The Round Table at JeRoe's. Memories of building sets for the Montevallo Main Street Players productions and countless others. "Three of the chambers will be empty with the passing of time. The fourth will remain."

Dr. Stephen Parker, professor emeritus of sociology, passed away on the morning of January 9, 2024. Dr. Parker started teaching at the University of Montevallo in 1992 and taught for 28 years before retiring in 2020.

Steve was born August 21, 1955, to Edward and Loretta Parker and grew up in St. Louis, Missouri. He was the oldest of 4 children and his time in St. Louis instilled in him a love of sports and music, which he maintained throughout his life. Steve attended Baylor University where he studied sociology, played soccer, and developed meaningful lifelong friendships. He liked to bend the rules...and he was good at not getting caught. Steve later completed a Ph.D. in Sociology at Indiana University, while also coaching the women's soccer team. He began his career as a professor at Ole Miss University, moving next to the University of Southern Mississippi, and finally coming to the University of Montevallo. Upon his retirement, he was named a "professor emeritus" for his service to the university. Throughout his life, he also continued coaching soccer in a variety of capacities, forming many bonds that he would cherish forever. In addition to his teaching and coaching, Steve also spent years leading Sunday School classes, overseeing church youth group activities, and occasionally offering sermons. He was a father, teacher, coach, friend, and mentor who impacted the lives of countless people over the years. He found joy in life's simple pleasures and cared deeply about everything he was involved in.

During his almost three decades at UM, Dr. Parker impacted the lives of thousands of students.





IMPROVING COMMUNITY BIKEABILITY: BIKEWAYS

Community bikeability (how suitable/fit for biking an area can be) is scored in a number of ways. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) asks the six questions that help us assess neighborhood bikeability. This month we will focus on the first question— Do you have a place to bicycle safely?

If your last ride was on the road, with motor vehicles, you may have encountered some of the following issues: no space for bicyclists to ride (no bike lane or shoulder; narrow lanes), disappearing bicycle lanes or paved shoulders, heavy and/ or fast-moving traffic, too many trucks or buses, no space for bicyclists on bridges, or poorly lighted roadways.

Immediate solutions to these roadway challenges:

- · Pick another route for now
- Tell the Public Works department about specific problems such as potholes or obstructions
- Take a class to boost your confidence about riding in traffic

Long-term solutions to these roadway challenges:

- Participate in local planning meetings
- Encourage Montevallo to adopt a plan to improve conditions, including a network of bike lanes on major roads
- Ask the Public Works department to consider adding "Share the Road" signs at specific locations
- Ask ALDOT to include paved shoulders on all their rural highways
- Join your local bicycle advocacy group ValloCycle

If your ride was on an off-road trail/path without motor vehicles, you may have encountered some of the following issues: path ended abruptly, path didn't go where I wanted to go, path intersected with roads that were difficult to cross, path was crowded, path was unsafe because of sharp turns or dangerous downhills, path was uncomfortable because of too many hills, or path was poorly lighted.

Immediate solutions to off-road trail/path issues:

- Slow down and take care when using the path
- · Find an on-street route
- Use the path at less crowded times
- Tell Parks & Recreation about specific problems

Long-term solutions to off road trail/path issues:

- Ask Parks & Recreation to improve directional and warning signs
- Petition ALDOT to improve path/roadway crossings
- Ask City Council, Parks & Recreation, and Trails Committee for more trails in our community
- Establish or join a "Friends of the Trail" advocacy group

After reviewing both short and long-term solutions, commit to seeing at least one solution through to the end. Getting involved is as easy as contacting the local government and your representative. Visit cityofmontevallo.com for a list

of department heads, committee members, and your local municipal representative

Bicycling, whether for transportation or recreation, is a great way to get physical activity into your day. Riding should be something you enjoy doing. Choose routes that match your skill level – start slowly and work to your potential.
