MONTEVALLO Main Street Memories

J.P. KELLY'S FAMILY HOME

The house behind the new City Hall where Christopher Smitherman has his law practice was owned and occupied by the Kelly family in the 1940's, 1950's, and 1960's.

Mr. J. P. Kelly was the president of Merchants and Planters Bank, which was situated at that time in the building on Main Street where La Conchita Bakery and Pastry is today.

The location of the bank was an easy walk for Mr. and Mrs. Kelly (the bank cashier) from their house in order to get to work each day. The Kellys' two sons, Agee and Pat, who grew up in the house, succeeded their parents as president and vice-president, respectively, of Merchants and Planters and took the bold step in the 1960's of constructing a new building on the site of the old St. George Hotel a few blocks east on Main Street. That building is Trustmark Bank today.









MONTEVALLO MAIN STREET MEMORIES is adapted from the series, THROWBACK THURSDAY, a **Montevallo Historical Society** and **Montevallo Main Street** partnership started in 2018. Each installment revisits commercial and residential life on Main Street and in the downtown area in the early to mid-twentieth century. 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"DOLLAR" BILL LAWSON NAMED TO COUNTRY RADIO HALL OF FAME

On July 10, 2023, a name familiar to many Alabamians will be added to the Country Radio Hall of Fame-that of "Dollar" Bill Lawson. Lawson, longtime co-host of the Dollar Bill and Madison morning show on Birmingham's 102.5 The Bull, and before that co-host alongside the late Patti Wheeler on WZZK (he moved with Wheeler to The Bull in 2002).

"Dollar" Bill has spent nearly 45 of years in Birmingham, becoming one of the most recognizable and beloved radio personalities in the Lawson will process. participate in a special induction ceremony on July 10. "I'm still trying to process that, to be honest with you," Lawson said looking back on his career. Dollar Bill's career took him around the state, starting at Tuscaloosa and later at Selma, Muscle Shoals and "DOLLAR" BILL LAWSON



he worked for legendary producer Sam Phillips at WXOR-WQLT. Phillips was known for launching the career of Elvis Presley and producing records by many of the great artists of blues, country and rock and roll. "I always wanted to come back home and work in Birmingham because that's where I'm from," Lawson said. "It's been a completely amazing life and a great career."

The nickname "Dollar" Bill started 30 years ago when his then-boss said that all DJs must have a nickname, because



nicknames would make them more memorable on the air. At the time, Lawson was giving away \$50 worth of Food World groceries as part of a weekly contest, so his boss came up with "Grocery Bag Bill." After sleeping on it, the two eventually came up with "Dollar" Bill and the name stuck.

Bill's Montevallo connection started twenty-five years ago, when he met his wife, Mary, a banker at Merchants & Planters, now Trustmark. In the time since, Lawson said Montevallo has become like his "second hometown" and he regularly participates in parades and emcees events there, becoming known as "The Voice of Montevallo." The University of Montevallo has named him an Honorary Alumni.

In 2019, Lawson was inducted into the Alabama Broadcasters Association Hall of Fame and received the Country Radio Broadcasters Tom Rivers Humanitarian Award. Over the years, he has donated his time and energy to many Birmingham area children's charities including the Children's Miracle Network, Easter Seals, the Muscular Dystrophy Association and St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. Lawson's caring spirit can also be seen in his relationship with his listeners.

"My focus was always on trying to do a good job," he said. "I looked at it like family and friends, and I really felt like I was forging true friendships, relationships with the listeners, and it was reciprocated." Lawson said that in the world of country music, disc jockeys also form special relationships with each other—something that does not happen in every corner of the industry. "It's just been the most blessed career I could have had. It's just been amazing," he said.

Bill has reached a 50-year milestone in his radio career and has just announced his retirement. But don't you worry Montevallo, Bill will continue hanging out in his "second hometown" especially since the City officially named April 10 as "Dollar Bill Day".

"They are tired of working for white people."

What do untold stories of a manufactured race war and a Black labor strike in Bibb county have in common? Both are offshoots of the double lynching on Montevallo's Main St in 1889.

The story of the Montevallo lynching is outlined on a marker installed in 2020 by the city in partnership with the Equal Justice Initiative. Two unnamed Black men were hanged by a white mob in retaliation for the murder the night before of a young white man, John Lawrence. He was fatally shot when he interrupted a burglary at his father-in-law's store at the corner of Main and Shelby Streets, where Provenance Church now stands. In the EJI analysis, the lynching exemplifies the racial terrorism that made life dangerous and uncertain for Blacks in the South well into the twentieth century.

It is fascinating to go back to newspaper coverage from 1889 to see how Montevallo's version of events compares with versions originating elsewhere, especially nearby Bibb County.

A Montevallo correspondent, a white man writing for white readers, creates an almost upbeat account, even expressing pride in the way the lynching was conducted: "no more quiet and orderly hanging ever took place." Readers are assured that everyone in town now feels safer. "A feeling of general satisfaction exists in the entire community" (Eufala Daily Times, 4 Sept). The entire community includes people of color. Prattville Progress (6 Sept) reported that "colored people of that vicinity seem to rejoice with the whites that the murderers are out of the way." Such accounts seem designed to allay white fears.

There are indications within the articles themselves, however, that things were not so rosy. Why else would a Montevallo citizen seek to squelch rumors that the town's Blacks, "incited by Saturday night's lynching," set fire to Capt. Reynold's barn the following night. The barn burning was in no way connected with the lynching, he insists. In fact, the "negroes here worked faithfully" to get the fire under control. The recent "excitement" has resulted in "a general uneasiness among women and children," he concedes, "but there really never was a community more secure than Montevallo at this time." (*Montgomery Advertiser*, 4 Sept)

Stories offered by Bibb county informants create a strikingly different picture of this "general uneasiness." Inflammatory phrases like "race war," "negro insurrection," "murderous conflict" run through feverish newspaper accounts reprinted across the nation. Typical is one from Chicago entitled "Bad Blood Stirred Up." The Montevallo lynching had "set the entire population, white and black, into a flame, and a murderous conflict may be expected at any moment."

Alarmed white citizens had sent for 100 Winchester rifles from Nashville. A Blocton mai predicted troubles. "The negroes were already wel aroused, and when they heard of the hanging o the two alleged burglars there were furious and were free with thei threats." Whites were free with their threats as well. A Centerville mai warned, "if a conflict came every negro in the county would be exterminated. (Chicago Tribune, 3 Sept)

To read this and other accounts, Black fury at the lynching and white fears of negro insurrection had brought citizens of this part of the world to the brink of a race war. A touch of hysteria, perhaps? An ingrained if mostly unfounded fear of Black uprisings? What is the untold story here?

Well, we may never know. Black perspectives would certainly help fill out the picture, but given the way Black history is passed down mostly by word of mouth, the chances of coming across a Black diary or letter are slight. But perhaps we can find a useful alternative version in "Unlooked-for Results of the Race Troubles in Bibb Co., Ala," an article which appeared in a Charlotte, NC paper.

After nearly three weeks of panicky evocations of an armed race war, this matter-of-fact approach to the "Race Troubles" will strike some as deliciously comical. Stockpiled Winchesters? Murderous rage? No, it seems some Black cooks and laundresses had stopped working for white folks. The troubles between Black and white begin to look more like a deliberate work stoppage, a strike. At its heart, this may have been a conflict between Black desire to do for themselves and white bafflement on how to handle the loss of cheap Black labor -- the cooks, laundresses, farm workers on whom whites had depended for generations. In the words of the Charlotte Observer (22 Sept):

The negroes have all resolved to do no work for white people. The negro women are in the movement and white families are unable to obtain cooks or women to do their laundry work. The negroes refuse to work on the farms, and many farmers will be unable to gather their crops unless they can obtain white laborers.

Some may hear an authentic voice of the Black community in the final sentence:

The only reason given by the negroes for their action is that they are tired of working for white people.

Hello, citizens of Montevallo! I hope all of you are doing well and enjoying the beginning of Spring. I would like to start things off by giving a huge shout out to the Montevallo Arts Collaborative for putting on another

outstanding event. I believe this was one of the largest Arts Fest that we have had in Montevallo. There were 160 artists displaying their talents along with around eight food trucks. On that same day, Ace Hardware had their soft opening and I couldn't be more pleased with the store. The grand opening will be sometime in June but the date has yet to be announced. Y'all go by the store and check things out! Storm Shelter #2 is now open! It is located at 20 James H Jones Dr., left of the MHS Football Stadium. A ribbon cutting was held on April 14th with meteorologist Mickey Ferguson and producer Kelly Garrett from WBRC Channel 6 News as special guests. This gives the City of Montevallo two storm shelters that are available to the public in the event of inclement weather. In the event of a tornado watch, the storm shelter will open and remain open until an "all clear" is given. The shelters are something that the city has spent a lot of money on, but hope we never have to use.

I am proud to announce that the kickoff of the ATRPP2 grant for Moores crossroads development is in motion. This project is made possible by a close to \$2 million grant for turn lanes and traffic lights at the intersection of State Highway 119 and County Road 22. That area of town is the gateway coming into Montevallo from the North, so we need it standing tall. I'm so thankful for the opportunity to be able to spruce up this region of the city and make that section of roadway safer. Hopefully, more commercial and retail development will begin in that vicinity and allow Montevallo to capture some of the tax revenue that we are losing to other cities.

The city finally has the go ahead on the Highway 25 sidewalk project. The sidewalks will be ADA compliant and will run from Lucky's to Pic'n Sav. The addition of the sidewalks will make that area more pedestrian friendly. The project is set to start early this summer.

Spring is a busy time of the year in Montevallo with baseball/ softball tournaments commencing at our ballparks. These tournaments attract visitors to our city which grows tax revenue. In addition, we also have high school and UM baseball/softball wrapping up their seasons. Come on out and catch a game!

Music at Owl's Cove Park will start up the last weekend in April and will run through the summer. The first event at the park will be Friday, April 28th at 6:30 p.m. Plan to bring your lawn chair or a blanket and come out for some great family friendly entertainment. Be sure to eat at one of our local restaurants or bring your dinner with you. I hope to see you there. Memorial Day will be observed on Monday, May 29th. H.G. MCGAUGHY FAREWELL

Montevallo lost one of its brightest city lights on March 28 with the death of H.G. McGaughy. No, he wasn't an elected official or the head of an important municipal department. Yet, he touched the lives of many of us with his engaging smile, his quick wit and, sometimes, with his frank and clear outspokenness.

About 18 months before his death, Mr. McGaughy began stopping at the city's main fire station for a blood pressure check, and it became one of his regular stops on his almost-daily travels around town. Another regular stop on his rounds was Czeskleba TV Service on Main Street. He and the shop's owner, Walt Czeskleba, were friends since "sometime in the 1970's," Czeskleba said. "I

was doing some TV work for his mother and daddy," Czeskleba said. Mr. McGaughys mother was very hard of hearing and put the television on high volume when her favorite daytime soap operas were broadcast, "and H.G.'s daddy used to sit out on the porch because of how loud it was. I fixed his mother up with a speaker right by her chair, so she could hear (the TV) without running him out of the room. "H.G. would come by three or four times a week and stay about an hour. It was part of his rounds --the drug store, the post office, the fire department," said Czeskleba. "He loved gossip! He'd always ask me: 'What you got today?" Mr. McGaughy was in no way a typical octogenarian, Czeskleba said. His interests were wideranging--from livestock to the stock market. He introduced Czeskleba to the latter "over 20-some years ago. Nothing out of the ordinary, just AT&T, the power company, stocks like that." "He was a character," said Czeskleba.

Sharing Mr. McGaughy's interest in livestock were Don and Nancy Simmer. The Simmers leased part of the McGaughy farm's 120 acres as pasture for 45 head of cattle. Don Simmer said he paid the lease annually on Jan.2. "I'd go up to his house and pound on the door and hand him a check. He had his conditions: I had to keep the grass cut (cows will eat the grass, but they know to avoid thistle) and keep the cows out of the pond."

The McGaughy farm has been designated a "century farm" by the state of Alabama because it has been in the same family for more than 100 years.

Most people are familiar with the McGaughy Farm because of the bright red caboose that sits in the front yard beside Salem Road.

Kay Goke, the fire department's public information officer recalled Mr. McGaughys visits to the station: "He would bring us goodies often and we'd share coffee. He'd tell us stories about the town, give relationship advice, tell us about his time in the Army traveling to Germany, and the McGaughy Family history."

She quoted Firefighter Matt Rush when describing Mr.

McGaughy's attitude toward aging: "He never knew his age and kept us smiling. He always said never get old and he didn't."


"He was like a one-stop shop for everything people needed--storyteller, living history book, advice giver, traveller, jokester, and expert on local spots. My personal favorite memories of him are his grin that would light up the room, and he'd always call me 'Babydoll,' and have a hug for me when I'd see him," Goke said.

Mr. McGaughy served for a time on the city's Design Review Committee and on the Historical Preservation Committee. He was a frequent attendee at Montevallo City Council meetings; usually he would sit near Bill Glosson who recalled a few heated meetings: "He could be pretty outspoken."

Mr. McGaughy died March 28 after a bad fall that sent him to the hospital in mid-March. Czeskleba said that Mr. McGaughy was in and out of consciousness and mostly kept in the ICU until he died. His wife, Doris, had died in 2020. They had no children.

Although nearly everyone called him "H.G.," Mr. McGaughy's given name was Herbert Galloway McGaughy. His mother's maiden name was Galloway, but she preferred to call him "Buddy," Czeskleba said.

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





The University of Montevallo is adding its 23rd sport.

With the recent addition of men's wrestling, Title IX requires an even number of men's and women's sports at one university. The solution: women's tumbling and acrobatics.

Tumbling and acrobatics will have its first competitive season in the spring of 2025, marking the 12th new intercollegiate sport to be added in the last 10 years.

Prior to that, she served as the Director of Public Relations and Marketing with



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RIDING IN A GROUP


