### THE CORNER OF SHELBY & MAIN

The building in the photo at bottom right can be easily seen today on Shelby Street, just off Main Street. It was originally constructed as a warehouse for the local Coca Cola distributor, Pete Givhan. You can see the building as it looked in the 1950's in the lower left photo. There is a Coca Cola delivery

truck parked across the street. Since then, the building has housed a Farm Supply business as well as an auto repair and detailing shop. At some point along the way two apartments were added upstairs.

The corner of Main and Shelby was the site of a Pan Am gas station (that's a Pan Am sign near the phone booth in the same photo). There was also a taxi stand at the gas station that serviced local residents who did not own cars.

The small building indicated by an arrow in the photo is thought to have had a local newspaper as a tennant

at one time. In the 1950's and 1960's, the local distributor of the Birmingham Post-Herald and the Birmingham News used the building to muster his "Paper Boys" each morning and afternoon. Several enterpris-

ing Montevallo youths would

gather at the building to roll fresh newspapers and tie them with string. The papers were then loaded into their bicycle baskets, each standing on end to

make them easy to grab and throw while pedaling, and, rain or shine, the boys would complete their designated delivery routes throughout the town. The paper boys were also responsible for collecting payments from their subscribers. Failure to collect would result in personal liability to the distributor for the amount owed.



The building that was home to Rogan's store for decades is today occupied by Provenance Church.

Rogan's Furniture Store occupied the first floor of the two story building on the corner for most of the 20th century. Mr. F. W. Rogan operated a diversified business that included an ambulance service and mortuary. Rogan's deceased customers were brought into the back of the building for embalming by way of a narrow alley. Coffins were also brought in through the alley and lifted to the second floor for storage by a hoist. Rogan closed the embalming business around mid-century when the Montevallo City Council decided that mortuaries were not suitable businesses for Main Street.





### WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA AT THE ALABAMA NATIONAL CEMETERY



### **SHOAL CREEK PARK FOUNDATION**

Established in 2015, the Shoal Creek Park Foundation (SCPF) is a nonprofit organization founded to support Shoal Creek Park, a City of Montevallo nature park.

SCPF advises the Montevallo City Council, raises funds to benefit the park and its visitors, and contributes to its maintenance and operation. The foundation is guided by Shoal Creek Park's mission to sustainably promote natural surroundings, health, regional history, environmental education, arts, and agriculture.

In the past year, the Foundation:

- Submitted a grant to get 10 benches installed in the park.
- Commissioned a ground-penetrating radar study by the University of Alabama's Office of Archaeological Research to investigate the cemetery at the former site of the Shoal Creek Baptist Church. The findings suggest the existence of 11 graves, which is close to the estimate of 13 graves that has been suggested for some years. These results will lead to accurate memorialization for the cemetery.

This year, our fundraising will support walking trail signage and improvements, removal of invasive species and raising awareness of the cemetery.

Ed. note: The next three Untold Stories begin to remember the story of slavery in the Montevallo area. A piece of that past is still visible in King House on the UM campus, built in 1823 by enslaved labor. The series culminates in the story of Sukey, a woman enslaved by Edmund King who went to extraordinary lengths to keep the female side of her family whole.

### I. REMEMBERING SLAVERY: THE KING PLANTATION

It's a touchy subject these days, slavery. "There are a lot of people who don't want to talk about it," remarks Black genealogist Peter Datcher. His work on family history in nearby Harpersville has gained wide recognition. He believes we have to talk about slavery. "Our ancestors who made it out of slavery are as close as we have to superheroes."

So let's talk about slavery right here on the campus of the University of Montevallo.

The small brick house on UM's quad known today as King House was originally the "big house" of a major slaveholding plantation. Surrounded by academic buildings, it sometimes goes unnoticed. But when completed in 1823, King House was known as Mansion House. Its wealthy white owner, Edmund King, was a leading figure in the local planter elite. His restored mansion is on the National Register of Historic Places. The structure bears a plaque honoring it as the first brick house in central Alabama and the first with glass windows.

Nothing is said about the enslaved people who made bricks from local clay to actually build the house.

Between 1823 and 1863 King enslaved at least two generations of people of African descent, as many as fifty at any given time. Probably more. We cannot be sure of exact numbers and know only a few of the names. Until 1870 the US Census records enumerated enslaved persons as property, listed by age and sex only under the name of the owner.

An inventory of King's estate at his death in 1863 tells us that King House was the hub of a number of outbuildings -- stables, barns, sheds, a smoke house, slave quarters. It was surrounded by an orchard, gardens, and fields for crops and livestock. The crops included wheat and corn, probably for home consumption. King may have grown cotton as well or he may have ginned it for his neighbors. He owned two cotton gins. In 1860 the plantation produced 10,000 pounds of baled cotton. (US 1860 Agricultural Production schedule.)

The fields and barns hosted an animal population that included two pair of working oxen, three mules, three horses and a colt, sixty-one pigs, forty-five sheep, forty-seven head of cattle, twenty-one ducks and seventy-six chickens. The King plantation sought to be self-sufficient as did other

plantations in the area. Agricultural and domestic activity on this scale required a large labor force. The inventory lists, just before the livestock, twenty-eight enslaved persons.

We know a lot about Edmund King and his white family. We know little about the lives of enslaved people who lived and worked on the property. Research on plantation households across the South allows some informed guesses. The "big house" -- often a modest structure like King House -- would have housed the master, mistress, and their white female children. The overseer and the family's white sons would occupy an adjoining wooden structure. That seems to have been the situation on the King plantation. Slave quarters, rough cabins housing one or two families, would have been located at varying distances from the "big house," with the field hands living at the furthest remove. Typically cooks, washerwomen, milkmaids, and nurses lived closer in. Children's nurses sometimes slept on the floor to be near the children. (Elizabeth Fox-Genovese, Within the Plantation Household, 102-3).

These days it is hard to summon up, even in imagination, the scenes of coerced labor enacted daily on the land surrounding King House. Stroll the central campus today, designed by a famous firm of landscape architects, and you will marvel at the tranquil beauty of the dappled shade and gently curving brick walkways. There's nothing to remind you that this too was one of the dark places of a distinctively American evil.

King House remains, of course, along with a few panes of its famed imported glass. But there is no signage, no narrative, no campus tour to connect King House to its history as a place of enslavement. The existence of the African American community that raised families in nearby rough cabins is often ignored, even forgotten.

For more than four decades men, women, and children found the strength, courage, and sheer grit to survive the hardships of slavery on soil that is now part of the UM campus. It is past time for their story to be told.



### FROM THE SEED-TO-TABLE COMMUNITY GARDEN

The best time to plant your fall garden crops in Alabama depends on the type of crop

you're planting and the soil temperature. Leafy greens and cruciferous vegetables all have different planting and harvest times. For leafy greens, the best time to plant is September, October and November. For cruciferous vegetables, the best time to plant is September and October. Frost can slow maturity or damage some crops. Frost can also significantly increase the intensity and flavor of many fall vegetable crops.

Leafy greens like lettuce, spinach and kale are fast-growing and can be harvested just a few weeks after planting. Cruciferous vegetables like collards, cabbage and broccoli are also great for fall gardens. They take a little longer to mature than leafy greens but are packed with nutrients.

TIM TINGLE AND FAMILY

### MONTEVALLO HONORS TIM TINGLE

One of Tim Tingle's earliest wood carvings was on display at the Montevallo City Council meeting on Monday, Oct. 9. The piece was a long slat of wood with colorful birds delicately carved into the surface. Each bird was painted and stood out in bright, stark contrast to the plain wooden background they flew through. This early carving of Tingle's was created when he was only in middle school and already hinted at both his incredible talent and the future impact he would have on his community. While Tingle never formally studied wood carving in college, he held a deep appreciation and love for the craft that made him pursue it on his own and have a willingness to constantly hone and improve his art.

It wouldn't be until after the 'Great Storm of the Century' in 1993 that the world would see the extent of Tingle's commitment to his craft. In 1993, a massive storm hit Alabama. Snow and ice rained down on Alabama for more than 12 hours and caused millions of dollars in property damage and numerous fatalities. The storm also severely damaged many of the trees in Orr Park, leaving many of its trees half-dead. Tingle saw a park that had once been a significant linchpin in the community reduced to something broken and dying. Still, he also saw an opportunity to use his skills to take something hideous and make it beautiful again.

"I didn't get permission," Tingle said. "I just came here to start carving faces on trees, and I'd sneak out before they could find out who it was." Tingle completed six carvings before he got caught. "When I got caught, I figured, 'Well, they're probably gonna prosecute me', so I went home, locked the door and waited for the police to come to dig me out," Tingle said. "But then someone from city hall called and said, 'Mr. Tingle, we realize you didn't have permission to hack on our trees, but we've decided not to prosecute you because everyone on the City Council seems to like your work." Now officially sanctioned, Tingle continued his carvings, and it was not long until they caught the world's attention outside of Montevallo.

"When the internet kicked in, pictures of my tree carvings started going all around the world, people from all over the country were stopping into this part to check them out," Tingle said. "It got so popular that the town had to start making modifications and improvements. They had another city council meeting and said, 'Look, Mr. Tingle, we got to compensate you in some way. You've done so much to

improve things in the park. We've got to compensate for it.' Instead of paying me, though, they changed the name of this section of trees along the creek here to Tinglewood."

Today, Tinglewood is one of the biggest tourist attractions in Montevallo, and is the host of many events, including the Tinglewood Art Festival, where Tingle is one of the many vendors selling wood carvings.

Back in September, the city of Montevallo celebrated the fifth annual Tinglewood Art Festival, where woodcarvers from all over the world came together to sell their wares and celebrate the art form. The Montevallo City Council decided to take a moment on Monday, Oct. 9 to celebrate Tingle and his contributions to the community at their regularly scheduled meeting. They presented Tingle with an official proclamation and a wooden plaque commemorating his work and contributions to the city of Montevallo.

"In recognition of celebrating 30 years of Carving in Orr Park," the plaque reads. "In appreciation of you giving your talent to all who walk the trail. In gratitude for your continued commitment to bringing delight to all who visit Tinglewood." The proclamation was meant to surprise Tingle, and the city council meeting was attended by Tingle's family, including his children and grandchildren.

"No value can be placed on what one man has done that brings such delight to the community and to all the folks from all over the world," Mayor Rusty Nix said.
